





Lot 1 - Amy's Light by Emma Garness



Amy's Light - Emma's design tempts you to find out more about the derring-do attitude of Hull's aviation champion Amy Johnson and the natural beauty of Spurn Point. The lighthouse is of great importance and holds a vital turning point in this story and its outcome. The Puss Moth is attracted to the safety of its light. On the back of the Puffin, Amy is centre stage with her high collar coat, and from her heart space flows the Puss Moth plane, compass, sea rocket, brent goose and water.

About the Artist: Emma's subject matter mostly investigates the concept of 'Nurture'. She is naturally drawn to work out how to interpret an emotion, a feeling or a moment of nostalgia. Key themes are family, stories and nature. She paints large street art/murals and smaller studio work where she uses acrylic and spray paint.
















Porcelain Coast Artist: Hollie Van De Vyver

Porcelain Coast - Inspired by vintage blue and white porcelain, Hollie's design shows the fragile balance of our endangered wildlife, featuring a basking shark, little tern and, of course, the majestic puffin. Give Seas a Chance - This design is painted in a gradient of uplifting colours and a flowing scene of the wildlife of the Yorkshire coast. These include the endangered bluefin tuna, dolphins, seals, seabirds and more. In the distance are the small colourful houses seen on the coastline. The artwork seeks to reimagine how the coast should look – thriving with abundant beautiful wildlife.

About the Artist: Maisie Baker a multi-disciplinary artist and designer, specialising in graphic design, mural painting and various forms of public art. She is interested in art that engages with the public and takes art out of the confines of the gallery.

Star Gansey - This Puffin represents the rich history of the region's fishing industry. A gansey was a hand knitted jumper, often made by wives or other family members, worn by fishermen. Each area of the country had its own design. The Humber area gansey was called the Humber Star.

## **Nest Builders Well Spotted**

**Artist:Kate Egglestone-Wirtz** 

Nest Builders Well Spotted - This artwork explores nature and humans sharing one collective nest, one home, our planet Earth, which the giant puffin is keeping a close eye on. The puffin is well spotted to symbolise bird watching/spotting, spots from disease or spots/locations where smaller individual homes might be built. The newly hatched chick represents the puffin's hopes for a healthy future, where humans take to heart the impact of their own nest building, which is symbolised by the houses on the puffin's back. All species have a right to nest safely, to thrive and fly. We are all connected.

About the Artist: Kate is an American multi-disciplinary artist and published poet who has lived in the UK for 25 years. She trained as an illustrator and now specialises in narrative 3-d assemblage art that focuses on place, identity and issue-based themes. Kate has worked in the creative industries for over 35 years and has exhibited worldwide along with winning awards in the 7th and 8th Annual 3-Dimensional Art Directors and Illustrators Awards | Show in New York City (1995, 1996), The Society for Art of the Imagination's Water exhibition in London (2004) and most recently the Art of Music Exhibition in Lancaster (October 2021).

Lot 7 - Yorkshire's Catch of the Day by Eleanor Sofia Walker



Yorkshire's Catch of the Day - Eleanor's design is inspired by the bountiful Yorkshire coast and the fisherfolk who have worked on the coasts for centuries. Much of our food is prepacked and on supermarket shelves – it's easy to forget the people behind it. This puffin shows all the amazing fish and seafood that we get from our own coasts, fished by local people. It may surprise you to know just how much comes and can come from our own seas, perhaps influencing your decision to shop local.

About the Artist: Primarily, Eleanor is a textile artist living and working in Yorkshire, handweaving soft furnishings like cushions, rugs, and blankets, inspired by nature and people. For her, weaving is a never-ending journey where craft, storytelling and the senses come together. She always tries to work with natural materials such as locally sourced alpaca, merino wool, and organic cotton. Alongside her textile work, Eleanor explores her ideas through other practices like illustration, painting, and ceramics.

Lot 8 - Lightbulb Moment by Hannah Watson



Lightbulb Moment - Hannah was inspired by the theme of global warming and green energy. To raise awareness of the darker side of her theme, Hannah presents us with a melting planet in an overheated light bulb, demonstrating the destruction caused by global warming.

She has painted ever since she can remember and, since the pandemic, she has found time to pick up her paint brush again and start reconnecting with her creative side. She uses a variety of mediums, mainly oil and acrylic on canvas, digital art and spray painting. Lot 9 - Turbulent Tides by Jasmine Hale



Artist: Jasmine Hale

Turbulent Tides - Global warming, melting ice, rising sea levels and warmer seas are all making life a lot harder for the amazing creatures that live in our oceans. Jasmine's design depicts melting Arctic ice dripping down her puffin's head, whilst fish swarm up the wings and back away from fuel-burning fire causing warmer waters at the bottom and having to avoid human detritus on the way! Hungry puffins and other sea birds dive for fish, whilst steamy storm clouds gather.

About the Artist: Jasmine Hale is a multidisciplinary artist from Hull, whose work ranges from painting and printing to video and performance art. Her live work often takes a humorous tone and a tongue in cheek look at current events and the often overlooked 'everyday', whilst her more visually focussed work makes use of bright colours, bold forms and dynamic line, instilling a real sense of vibrancy and movement. Jasmine currently resides in Leeds, having completed a BA (Hons) in Fine Art at Leeds Arts University in 2020.

She also makes willow lanterns and organises the Bridlington Old Town Lantern Walk every December. Lot 14 - Headscarf Revolutionary by Susan J. Woolhouse



# Headscarf Revolutionary Artist:Susan J. Woolhouse

"Headscarf Revolutionary - A Headscarf Revolutionary was a woman who was part of the Hessle Road Women's Committee, Hull, led by Lillian Bilocca. Outraged and incensed by the Triple Trawler disaster of early 1968 and the continuing lack of safety measures in place by the trawler owners of Hull, they took direct action, campaigning all the way to Westminster and Harold Wilson's government. They ensured every measure included in their safety charter was implemented. The Headscarf Revolutionaries were ordinary working class women of the 1960's, interfering in 'men's business' against all opposition, and made change happen that saved countless more lives."

About the Artist: Susan is an artist from Hull with a strong fishing heritage. Her forefathers date back to the whaling days of Hull and her mother hailed from the Hessle Road fishing community. Susan's favourite pieces portray fearless women in their truest light. She likes to produce art that starts conversations and brings inspiration to other women and girls of all ages that they too can make change happen. Susan is drawn to the real. To art that makes you feel something deeply when it is on your wall, is grounded in love and connection and truth, and all done with a dry Northern sense of humour.
